George Nixon Webb, 93, a longtime resident of Miami, Oklahoma, passed away on Saturday, March 21, 2026, in Miami. Mr. Webb was born March 25, 1932, in Miami, Oklahoma, to George S. and Pearl M. (Nicksch) Webb. Mr. Webb graduated from Miami High School Class of 1950 and earned an Associate's Degree from Northeastern Oklahoma A&M in 1952. He attended the University of Oklahoma, obtaining a Bachelor of Science in Chemical Engineering. Before graduating, he married his High School sweetheart and love of his life, Frances Hatfield, in Miami, Oklahoma, on December 27, 1954. After completing his education at OU, he served his country in the United States Army, including a year and a half in Schweinfurt, Germany. George and Frances returned to Miami, where they would raise their family and spend many wonderful years together. Mr. Webb worked for Eagle Picher as a Chemical Engineer for 35 years at the Miami Research Lab and Boron Plant in Quapaw, Oklahoma, retiring in 1995 as the Boron Plant Superintendent. His interests included photography, history, bird watching, and travel. When he was not working, he and Frances loved to travel to as many National Parks and Historical Sites as possible and filled up two National Parks Passport Books. He was a member of the Ottawa County Historical Society, where he served as president for over ten years, and a member of the Grand Lake Audubon Society, where he served as president for a number of years. He was also a member of the Ottawa County Camera Club and was an active member of the First United Methodist Church in Miami

for over 60 years.

Mr. Webb is preceded in passing by his parents, George and Pearl Webb, and his granddaughter Kara Alford.

Those left to share the wonderful memory of Mr. Webb include his wife of seventy one years, Frances Webb of the home, two daughters, Karen Webb of Irving, Texas, and Linda (Webb) O'Brien and her husband Bill, of Jenks, Oklahoma, brother, Carl Frank Webb, grandson, Jeremy Jacobson, four great grandchildren, Paige Delmont, Caitlin Delmont, Kylee Delmont, Layne Roberts, and two great-great grandchildren, Kennedee Thomson and Da'Vion Harris.

There will be a visitation for Mr. Webb from 5:00 PM to 7:00 PM on Thursday, March 26, 2026, at Brown-Winters Funeral Home and Cremation Service in Miami.

Graveside services have been scheduled for 2:00 PM, Friday, March 27, 2026, at Grand Army of the Republic Cemetery in Miami, with Reverend Robert Rose officiating.

“ The below remembrance is from Richard Hatfield, brother-in law to George Nixon Webb.

I wanted to share a few words about George who I have known for a very long time – not as long as his brother Carl Frank Webb - but pretty close.

George was an extremely honest person, quiet, steady and a fantastic mentor to all during his lifetime.

His parents greatly influenced him, as they had lived through the depression. His father worked for Sinclair delivering gas to farmers and his mother taught school. At that time women could only be a nurse or a teacher. Think of all the students she influenced throughout her life to be good decent individuals including her sons George and Carl Frank.

George walked 1.5 miles to date my sister, Frances Hatfield. I was young and harassed them by looking at them through the blinds. They ignored me, which was good! Lonnie Sutton and I were candlelighters at their wedding and Dr. Michael Haugh, our cousin, sang the Lord's Prayer.

They lived together for over 71 years in different cities and homes. While stationed in Germany, they had their first daughter, Karen Sue in 1957. George and Frances stayed in contact with their friends in Germany throughout their lives.

When they came back to the United States he worked as an engineer. Linda was born in Natchez, Mississippi in 1959. In 1960 George went to work for Eagle Picher in Miami, Oklahoma and retired there in 1995.

Although they traveled to many countries during their lifetime, Miami has always been home. They worked for the Ottawa County Historical Society, and participated along with other members of the community to restore the Coleman Theatre back to its original

condition from 1929. Miami is a very progressive city with fantastic relationships including NEO A&M. George has been a silent supporter as they believed in the importance of educating our youth.

Karen, Linda and Bill O'Brien have supported them throughout their lives and especially during the last few years. Bill drove them to many doctor appointments in Joplin, Missouri, and also assisted them with many projects, large and small, around the house.

George has been a great mentor to me and many others during his lifetime!
